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
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Historic Tour of the Little Moose Campus at the Adirondack League Club Fundraiser June 11, 2009

We hope you can join us in this rare opportunity to tour League Club buildings on Little Moose Lake, a totally privately-owned lake in the Adirondack League Club's 54,000 acre wilderness preserve.

Guests arriving at the Little Moose gate house will receive a gate pass to proceed to the Mountain Lodge with valet parking. Following greetings at the Summer House, tour guides will lead small groups of people at intervals on a 30 minute narrated tour of three 1906 Club Cottages designed by Augustus D. Shepard, the 1908 wooden tennis courts rebuilt in 1923, the 1912 Little Moose boat house built and designed by Shepard with many antique guide boats including the "Resaca" that once belonged to President Benjamin Harrison, the 1914 Mountain Lodge (ALC Summer House), the 1914 Little Moose Guides' House expanded to be the present Winter House, and the 1925 Doctors' residence and his office.

Guests will receive a souvenir program book and enjoy refreshments at the open bar and hors d'oeuvres in the living room of the Summer House before and after the tours. Tickets are limited and must be purchased in advance for this event at \$90 per person for Town of Webb Historical Association members and \$100 per person for non-members. # Funds No Longer Available for Energy Conservation Project!

In February of this year, a letter was received from our State Senator, James L. Seward. The news was bad. The legislature passed the governor's deficit reduction plan and the Legislative Initiative monies set aside for our energy conservation project would not be available.

Back on August 1, 2008, representatives from several organizations in the Town of Webb posed for a photo opportunity to announce much needed grants. The Town of Webb Historical Association was to receive \$15,000 for energy conservation projects. This organization had put off improvements for three years as we tried to raise money through grants for much needed projects. Finally securing funding, we went forward, using our savings to work on the projects knowing we would be able to pay the savings account back when the grant money was received.

There is still hope that the promised State monies will become available at some point in the future. In the meantime, we are grateful for the wise leadership and financial stability of the Town of Webb Historical Association. The improvements we made were necessary and will result in tangible and money saving benefits. If you can make a contribution toward this energy conservation project at this time, it would be greatly appreciated.

#### MAP PROJECT

Much progress has been made identifying, re-housing and preserving a large collection of Town of Webb area maps and blue prints received in 2008. Interns continue to work part-time on this project.

Duplicate maps not accessioned into the collection of the Town of Webb Historical Association will be offered to other local museums and for sale to the public through our gift shop or at auction to generate operating capital.

Funding for purchasing map cabinets and intern salaries for this project was received from a 2008 grant from the Wesley & Marion Small Fund of The Community Foundation of Herkimer and Oneida Counties, Inc.

#### Camps in the Woods

On Monday, April 14, 1913 at 7:46 in the evening, the Old Forge Rescue Hook and Ladder Co. rang the bell above their new station summoning members to a fire at the Adirondack League Club's Mountain Lodge at Little Moose Lake three miles from the center of Town. By the time the firemen arrived with their horse-drawn pumper and hose cart, the magnificent 20-year-old clubhouse was doomed and they concentrated on saving the boathouse and nearby cottages. The fire that destroyed the unoccupied structure was thought to have been caused by mice nibbling on matches. Later that year, the Club's Directors assigned the design of a new clubhouse to one of their own members; architect Augustus D. Shepard Jr. of New York City.


The Shepard family had been associated with the Club since its formation in 1890. Augustus Shepard's uncle Elliott F. Shepard was a founding member. Elliott published the *Mail and Express* newspaper in New York City and was married to Margaret Louise Vanderbilt, the eldest daughter of William

Henry Vanderbilt and sister of Mrs. William Seward Webb. Augustus D. Shepard Jr.'s father assumed management of the newspaper following Elliott's untimely death in 1893 along with its editor Robert C. Alexander, another founding member of the Adirondack League Club. Augustus Jr. was a frequent visitor to the Club's preserve in the 1890s. His brother-in-law John Doull Miller purchased a lot at Bisby Lake in 1894 and Augustus Jr. bought Lot 3 on Honnedaga Lake in January of 1897. Both later built camps on Little Moose Lake.

Like many of his turn-of-the-century contemporaries, Augustus played polo, mastered four-in-hand coaching skills, and attended numerous debutant parties and extravagant Gilded-Age weddings. His own wedding to Marie Baxter Rees in 1908 took place in Ashville, NC. Private railcars brought many members of the Webb and Vanderbilt families to the nuptials. That he was drawn to architecture as a career was not surprising. William Rutherford Mead of the well-known architectural firm McKim, Mead, and White was his mother Joanna's

brother. Augustus Jr.'s first business partner Abner J. Haydel was a nephew of architect Sanford White. One of their first projects was a chapel in Scarborough, NY commissioned by Augustus' aunt Margaret Louise Shepard in memory of her husband Elliott. In 1900, Haydel & Shepard designed a Beaux-Arts townhouse on 62<sup>nd</sup> Street in NYC for Margaret's daughter Edith who married Ernesto Fabbri at the Scarborough chapel in 1896. The townhouse survives and was sold a few years ago as a residence for the Japanese ambassador for \$21 million.

But it is the rusticated Arts and Craft style cottages, lodges, and boathouses that Augustus D. Shepard Jr. designed over a span of forty years at the Adirondack League Club that he is most

remembered for today. "The camp must possess certain inherent qualities of the forest," he wrote in an anthology of his work called "Camps in the Woods," published in 1931. Shepard's structural use of exposed honey-toned peeled spruce and the simplicity of his designs that melded into their natural lakeside settings were an inspiration for the lodges incorporated into many State and National parks. Shepard, a widower since 1921, died in Darien, CT in 1955 survived by his two children. The Historical Association's June 11<sup>th</sup> tour at the Adirondack League Club offers a rare opportunity for the public to view the regional architectural legacy of this significant Gilded-Age architect. 
