

## **Floating Letters**

The Town of Webb and its over 480 square miles of land and water holds many interesting stories of the history of this area. The Museum Committee, chaired by Terry Rozycki, selected the topic of the Mail Boat for the next exhibit to be featured at the Goodsell Museum from November 26, 2010 through October 31, 2011.

This exhibit will present the history of the delivery of mail by boat in the Town of Webb on the Fulton Chain, Big Moose Lake and Twitchell Lake—from the early 1880's until today. For a few months each summer, on some lakes, mail delivery by boat continues to be an important service and a social event enjoyed by children, grandchildren, seasonal residents, visitors, and man's best friend—his dog.

Soon the front room of the museum will display many items such as photographs, certificates, ledgers and maps; and many examples of mail bags, donated or on loan, that will show the varied materials used to make the bags that held the mail for delivery by boat. The committee is grateful for all the information, pictures, artifacts, and stories shared for this exhibit that will also add more documented history to our files. Additional information and artifacts are welcome at any time.

## **Thendara Historic District**

As a result of the efforts of H. Stuart deCamp, owner of Moose River House Bed and Breakfast and the Thendara Town Hall, a section of Thendara (formerly called Fulton Chain until late in 1919) has been listed on the New York State Register of Historic Places as an Historic District. Included in this new Historic District are Van Auken's Inne, Thendara Train Station and the Thendara Train Maintenance Building along with deCamp's two businesses.

This listing is simply a recognition of historic importance. It can be viewed as a source of community pride and identify an area for heritage development and tourism.

It does not protect any of the buildings from being torn down or remodeled. It does not limit the use of paint, roofing, siding or building materials.

This recognition does open opportunities for certain grants, possible tax breaks, etc. The State Review Board shall now forward the nomination to the Keeper of the National Register in Washington, D.C.

#### Fulton Chain Mailboat - The S. S. Old Forge

In April of 1901, Dr. William Seward Webb came to Old Forge to oversee the purchase of the Crosby Transportation Company's franchise that included a 2-mile spur railroad through town, the waterfront docks and the steamers Fulton, Stowell, J. L. Connell, and the Zip. All of the boats were repainted, carpeted and refurnished throughout and given new names. The fastest boat in the fleet, the Zip, was now called the S. S. Old Forge. The elegant steamboat Clearwater, put into service in 1900, was also purchased by Webb and his associates.

Four months later in August, Dr. Webb was issued a certificate to operate a Railway Post Office (RPO) onboard a mailboat to service more than 100 camp owners and hotels along the Fulton Chain. Even though Captain Jonathan Meeker exchanged mail bags along the route as far back as 1883 when he put the first steamboat Hunter on the lakes,



this new RPO status entitled an official post office employee to cancel the mail onboard and perform other postal duties.

The steamer Zip was brought to the Fulton Chain in 1894 for Captain John Sprague and William Sperry. It was built several years before as an Erie Canal excursion boat for Captain William A. Walker of Rome, NY. Walker, a watchmaker by profession and a skilled mechanic, was a veteran of the Civil War. His son, William N. Walker, was a close friend of Dr. John M. Barton of Rome, an early camp owner of an island in Fourth Lake. This connection may have led to the relocation of the Zip to the North Woods.

Captain Sprague issued dark blue suits and caps to Zip employees similar to those worn later on by S. S. Old Forge pilot Seth Burton Youmans and engineer Chauncey Covey in this wonderful photograph. Postal clerk Curtis "Curley" Ervin wears the derby. Sprague also

installed the enormous headlight, patented by Irvin A. Williams of Utica. Irvin amassed a fortune by manufacturing

headlights for locomotives and had a summer home on Big Moose Lake.

In those days, the mail and express packages on the Zip were delivered twice a day and once on Sundays. From ice-out in the spring until late autumn when thick fog enveloped the lakes, the sound of the mailboat's horn was a welcoming notice of its pending arrival. Foot-soldiered postal employees were noted for delivering the mail despite rain, sleet or snow, but the crews onboard the mailboat had their own unique, unimaginable experiences. A serious accident occurred on a stormy night in September of 1898. The Zip had just left former President Benjamin Harrison's dock on Second Lake when it was struck midship by the steamer Stowell. The mailboat sank 40 feet to the bottom of the lake. Three crew members and a NYC passenger were fortunately rescued from the chilly water. The little steamer was disabled again in 1899 when it struck a log near deCamp Island in First Lake. On its second day of mailboat service in July of 1901, the refurbished Zip, now called the S. S. Old Forge, crashed at full force into Gull Rock on Fourth Lake. It survived a fire in 1910 when the headlamp exploded as the mailboat approached the dock of the Wood Hotel in a severe windstorm.

Despite the construction of roadways on both sides of the lakes and the decline of steamboat travel, Maurice Callahan and several partners purchased the Fulton Navigation Company's remaining fleet in 1923. The S. S. Old Forge again needed repairs the following summer after colliding with a stump in Third Lake. The most tragic mailboat accident occurred in July of 1926. Mail clerk Cecil Sheley died after falling through a rope barrier into Fourth Lake following an exchange of mail bags with camp owners at a dock near the Onondaga Hotel. The resilient little steamer S. S. Old Forge's days however were numbered in spite of her faithful service to her owners for over 30 years. When the mailboat contract was awarded to the Burnap family in 1929, the S. S. Old Forge was retired. Her hull was laden with heavy stones and it was sent to the deepest part of First Lake where she rests today. The Goodsell Museum's new exhibit chronicles the technological history of all of the mailboats and the powerful human stories of their dedicated crews that have provided this important service for residents and visitors to our region for more than a century.

#### Civil War 1861-1865

This area of the Adirondacks was not very populated when the Civil War broke out in 1861. A few veterans did live in Old Forge after the war. No Civil War veterans are buried in Riverview Cemetery.

Bruce Bonfield will present a program "Civil War-Fight for Freedom" tentatively scheduled for July 27, 2011 at the Thendara Town Hall. The talk will be based upon the Civil War letters and diary of Lt. Gilbert Cooley, Company "D"21st Iowa Volunteer Infantry.

Plans are being made to hold a couple additional programs on the subject of the Civil War that same week to recognize the 150th anniversary of the beginning of the war. Check the local newspapers or our website for more details in the future.
